Museums tell teenagers: We're here for you

Elkeyshia Webster, 11, had no interest in going to a program at the Pérez Art Museum Miami on a Saturday when she could be home, watching TV. And she was particularly angry when she found out that the event involved working with the police.

"I really didn't want to be there, but my mother made me," she said. "I haven't had a good experience with police." Elkeyshia, known as Shia, was 8 when she and her mother were going out for pizza. She said the police pulled over their car



and pointed a gun at them, mistakenly believing they had been involved in a drug deal.

But Art Detectives, a new three-day program scheduled to run on consecutive Saturdays, and whose pilot version took place last year, is directed at young people just like Shia. And it is part of a growing movement across the country to create programs for preteens and teenagers that use innovative art concepts to explore challenging ideas.

How good is your evidence?

Social purpose organizations need better ways to determine the quality of the evidence they use for making decisions. They need the strongest possible evidence they can find to plan effective action, demonstrate the value of their activities to funders and stakeholders, and influence public policy.

Yet funders, policy makers, and managers face competing definitions of what constitutes quality evidence. And while using evidence of any kind to make decisions is better than using no evidence, existing definitions may cause leaders to overlook valuable information that would improve their chances of making truly effective decisions.

Many in the field are calling for higher standards for evidence, or "stronger evidence." Read more.






